Demographics

US Census Bureau <u>....</u> Population of the United States in 2018: 327,167,434. African American 40,610,815 (12.4%) <u>.....</u> Hispanic or Latino (of any race) 56,510,571 (17.27%)

Mortality from COVID-19

- Up to date (June 11): 23,769 Black lives have been lost to COVID-19
- African Americans account for 13% of the US population, but 24 % of the deaths where race has been reported, according to the <u>COVID</u> <u>Racial Data Tracker</u>
- African Americans are dying from COVID-19 at a rate that is almost double than their population share.

Income inequalities

- The measures to slow down the transmission of COVID-19 and mitigate its effect will no doubt have an economic impact on the nation.
- The heaviest burden will be carried by the populations with less income.
- 2018 median income
 - White, not Hispanic: \$70,642
 - African Americans: \$41,361
 - Hispanics it was \$51,450




Figure 1. Source: Semega, Jessica L, John Creamer, Melissa A Kollar, and Abinash Mohanty. *Income and Poverty in the United States: 2018*. Washington, DC: Government Printing Office Washington, 2019.

Income inequalities

- For families in the lowest income brackets, the closure of schools translates into reduced nutrition for many children whose main meal of the day is provided at the school.
- 2018 poverty rate
 - 8,1% for White, non-Hispanic Americans
 - 20.8% for African Americans
 - 17.6% for Hispanics

Poverty Rate and Percentage Point Change by Selected Characteristics: People





Figure 2. Source: Semega, Jessica L, John Creamer, Melissa A Kollar, and Abinash Mohanty. *Income and Poverty in the United States: 2018*. Washington, DC: Government Printing Office Washington, 2019.

Income inequalities

- With schools closed, many parents and care givers have limitations to leave the house in order to work.
- Felt more severely in single parent households, whose majority are single mothers.
- Poverty rates by family type:
 - Married couples: 4.7%
 - Single mother w/ children under 18: 39,1%
 - Single mother w/ children under 6: 47,7%.
- Clearly: households with small children, especially w/ single mother, in the African American and Hispanic communities will suffer the most...

Insurance

- It is still not clear if everyone will get the Covid-19 test for free or covered by insurance.
- Lack of insurance affects African Americans and Hispanic disproportionally
- Lack of economic resources to cover copayments will burden African American, Hispanics, and poor White, non-Hispanic individuals.

Homeless population

- High risk because of lack or resources, compounding diseases, and limited access to healthcare
- Accounted for 552.839 people in 2018.
- African Americans and Hispanics are disproportionally represented in the homeless population

Community Care
